Some topline stats

- There were a total of 272 responses:
 - 94% CH residents, 5% UH, 1% former/elsewhere
 - 82% of respondents live in single family homes; 9% in apartments; 6% duplex; 3% in condos/townhouses
 - 85% homeowners; 14% renters; 1% other
 - 27% have lived in their homes 1-5 years; 22% 15-30 yrs; 17% 30-45 yrs;
 13% 5-10 ys; 9% 0-1 yrs; 8% 10-15 yrs; 4% more than 45 yrs
 - o 75% live with 2-5 people; 24% live alone; 1% live with 6 or more people
 - 81% live on streets with single family homes; 15% have both single family and apartment buildings; 4% have only apartment buildings

Some topline stats (cont'd.)

- There were a total of 272 responses:
 - 63% identified as female; 30% as male; 5% preferred not to say; 2% as transgender/nonbinary
 - 24% were ages 70-80; 21% were ages 60-69; 19% were ages 30-39; 14% were 50-59; 14% were 40-49; 6% were ages 18-29; 2% were over the age of 80
 - 80% identified as White; 8% identified as Black; 7% preferred not to say;
 3% identified as multi-racial; 1% identified as LatinX; 1% identified as Asian

Respondents are most interested in:

- City's future plans about housing development 144 respondents rated as "very interested"
- Racial justice & equity in the Heights 130 rated as "very interested"
- Employing home services and repair personnel 115 rated as "very interested"
- Resources regarding housing preservation 106 rated as "very interested"
- How to deal with nuisance conditions or conduct in my neighborhood 97 rated as "very interested"
- Financing for home improvements 92 rated as "very interested"
- Better internet service 91 rated as "very interested"
- Assistance for elders aging in place 89 rated as "very interested"
- How to deal with blighted houses near me 88 rated as "very interested"

Respondents are least interested in:

- Resources for first-time home buyers 120 rated as "not interested"
- Resources on foreclosure procedures 115 rated as "not interested"
- Resources about renter's rights & responsibilities 100 rated as "not interested"



Respondents identified 67 different neighborhoods.



Where do you see opportunities for preserving your neighborhood?


- Reduce predatory landlords (29)

Proximity to schools (92)




50.7% of respondents feel "very at home" in their neighborhood.

Respondents identified these as what they'd be most willing to take action on:

- Have opportunities to get to know neighbors (99)
- Participate in neighborhood litter cleanup (98)
- Improving safety (97)
- Creating neighborhood group/block club (79)
- Advocating for sidewalk repair (78)

Respondents identified these as what they'd be least willing to take action on:

- Improving residential parking (172)
- Advocating for/creating a pocket park (92)
- Advocate for more/improved public transportation (92)
- Advocating for bike lanes (88)
- Advocating for or helping to create a community garden (82)

Topline Takeaways:

- Respondents want improved communication/transparency with the City
- Respondents want clear methods and procedures for dealing with bad or absentee landlords.
- Respondents want a proactive plan to deal with vacant/abandoned or blighted properties.
- Respondents want to create a greater sense of equity across the city as a whole.
- Respondents identified safety and sustainability as top priorities in their neighborhoods/dwellings.

What people love the most:

Neighbors, neighborhoods, and, of course, the trees.

What is surprising:

ZERO of our action-oriented topics had "very willing" to take action as a result, while FIVE topics'
most popular response was "not at all willing" to take action.
